Presentation of President's Truncheon and Regimental Truncheon to the Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment

Ever since the establishment of Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment, the Regiment has earned a name as one of the formidable regiments for their immense contribution and sustained efforts in the protection of territorial integrity of the motherland. The regiment has also earned a name as one of the most professional infantry regiments through their contributions in the UN Peacekeeping Forces. A total of 143 Officers and 3,719 Other Ranks of the Regiment had sacrificed their lives in the combat while 82 Officers and 3,137 Other Ranks have been disabled. The role played by the Sinha Regiment warriors in rescue operations in natural disasters and their exceptional performances at international sports events have brought pride to the motherland. In recognition of their unstinted excellence, discipline, and professionalism in services performed for the country, it has been recommended to endow Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment with President's Truncheon and Regimental Truncheon.

Traditionally, rifle regiments do not carry cololurs. Rifle regiments do not bear colours when engaged in small group operations and when snipers are engaged to annihilate the enemy. Therefore, rifle regiments do not bear standard colour flags. The British Rifle Regiment and Royal Gurkha Rifles carry the Queen's Truncheon, in lieu of colours, which was presented to them by Her Majesty Queen Victoria in 1983. Going by the same tradition, Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment too never carry colours. Thus, Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment has fulfilled every requirement to be awarded with the prestigious President's Truncheon and Regimental Truncheon in lieu of colours by the Chief of Armed Forces, HE the President of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

This Truncheon is 6 feet high and made of bronze and silver. The top represents the minaret of Delhi Palace with three Gurkhas standing on it supporting the Queen's crown above their heads. The minaret contains a pair of kukris, the national weapon of the Gurkha, and carries the inscription "Main Piquet Hindoo Rao'S House, Delhi 1857". Below this again is another silver ring on which is inscribed on three sides "Sirmoor Rifles"









The design of the President's Truncheon and the Regimental Truncheon of Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment






Design of the Regimental Truncheon



President's Truncheon and Regimental Truncheon Explained



The head of the Truncheon is surmounted by the national emblem of Sri Lanka supported by the pot of plenty placed on a lotus which symbolizes rising and blooming above the murk. (The pot of plenty spouting with lotus buds represents four directions).



The crest of the Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment, the one and only rifle regiment of the Sri Lanka Army, is placed on the pot of plenty which symbolizes prosperity which is placed on a lotus which symbolizes rising above the mud or rising against all odds. (The pot of plenty spouting with lotus buds represents all four directions).



The Regimental Flag of Sri Lanka Sinha Regiment and three rifles with bayonets are encased in a cabin surrounded by three stone pillars erected on a lion's base, surmounted by three lions depicting the Regiment's unwavering commitment in protecting the motherland.



Three lions sejant on a lotus base depict security, vigilance and unwavering commitment in the protection of the motherland from all forms of enemy threats.





The staff of the Truncheon depicts the unmatched prowess of the soldier who rises above all odds through discipline, and excellence in training achieved through self-pride and self-respect.
